Facts and Stats

"A" average for October

According to Idaho Code 39-5701, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare must inspect each business that sells tobacco to ensure that it does not sell tobacco to minors. In October 2015:

- 136 Retailers were inspected.*
- 9 Retailers sold to the inspecting minor.
- The compliance rate for the month was 93.38%

*Inspections where purchase attempts were made.

Don't Forget to Renew your Tobacco Permit

Tobacco permits are free and required by law for all tobacco retailers in Idaho. Retailers are required to renew permits annually by **December 31.** Renewal is quick and easy! Warnings for Children and FDA Rules

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has assessed the trend of increasing calls to poison control centers and visits to emergency rooms related to liquid nicotine poisoning and exposure. This trend is related to the increasing popularity of electronic nicotine devices that use liquid nicotine that often comes in large containers. The public should be aware of the dangers of nicotine exposure for infants and children. The FDA is also considering requiring that some tobacco products be sold in child-resistant packaging to reduce the risk of exposure.

The FDA will considered input, data, and research to help with their decision to make this new rule. The process in creating new rules relating to tobacco products are generally 1) publishing the proposed rule, 2) providing 60-90 days for the public to comment, 3) issuing a final rule based on comments, and 4) enforcing that retailers and business comply with the new rule.

Comments regarding the new rule on liquid nicotine packaging closed August 31. The FDA is now in phase 3 of their process of assessing public comments. Stay tuned for their decision on possible new regulations on liquid nicotine, or read more at http://fda.gove/TobaccoProducts.

No-Tobacco-Sale Order

In May the FDA issued a draft guidance regarding the No-Tobacco-Sale Order (NTSO) to ban the selling of tobacco products for a period of time for retailers who have repeatedly violated certain restrictions on the sale and distribution of tobacco products. The draft guidance includes language about the FDA's regulations restricting the sale and distribution of cigarettes and smokeless tobacco to children and adolescents and grants authority to impose an NTSO on a retailer when there are five violations that occur within 36 months. The Tobacco Control Act does not establish specific periods of time for an NTSO, but allows the FDA to take into account the nature, circumstances, extent, and gravity of the violations, as well as other factors. However, a retailer may lose permanent tobacco selling authority after three NTSO violations. The draft NTSO is viewable on the fda.gov website.
